




- OCore Bites Completed in class each day (binder) OMath 4 Today (M4T)- Completed weekly (binder) with an assessment on Friday.

**These folders stay in our classrooms.


ELA - Social Studies

Homewark

Reading, writing, and social studies are all integrated.
